I try not to write about myself too much in this column, but I need to fill up some more space. REFLECTIONS FROM THE WEST COAST

What a pleasant surprise it was to receive the letter asking for reminiscences from long-time CCOA members.

I purchased my first car at 16, when I bought a 10-year old Lime Frost (what else?) 1967 standard in 1977. It was in great shape and I really enjoyed it as I made it even better. I was always looking for a club to join. There were none anywhere in Northern California where lived, and I had never heard of another until I read a small ad in Hemmings Motor News in 1980, advertising the formation of the Cougar Club of America.

I responded to the ad and soon enough, I was a member. It was great to learn how many other people out there appreciated our cars, and that they were all over the USA. The early newsletters were pretty basic, typed and copied, but to me they contained a great deal of information about our cars - how to fix common problems, rare models, Kevin Marti building a'67 convertible (!), and much more.

A few years later, I sold my (now red) '67 and had a light blue'73 XR-7 convertible, which I really liked and put quite a few miles on during my period of ownership. During the early and mid-1980's, I continued to enjoy the CCOA newsletter, but was unable to attend any shows. As I recall, they were not located anywhere near where I lived while going to college, but I did attend local Cougar shows and other car shows, sometimes showing the'73.

Lt was not until July 1995 that I was able to attend and show my car at a national CCOA show, the one hosted by the Mercury Stray Cats in Concord, CA. At that time I had (and still have) a mostly original Augusta Green'68 standard, which took first place in its class. Thereafter, if there was a CCOA sponsored show in California, I made

it a point to attend and that car has placed well, as have a few other Cougars I have owned, like a Jamaican Yellow'67 standard, and a bench seat-equipped Lime Frost'68 standard.

I have also attended many Mercury Stray Cats shows and events, and am a past President of that club.

In 1997, we caravanned up to Seattle for the CCOA West Show which celebrated the 30th anniversary of the Cougar, where I had the great honor of meeting Gayle Warnock. Sitting with Gayle and his wife at dinner and learning a lot about the original marketing campaign was great experience.

I've also attended the Fun Ford Sunday and Fabulous Fords Forever shows over the past 15+ years. At these events, I have had the good fortune to meet people like Jim Pinkerton (#5909), John Benoit (#4062) and Don Rush (#6123), as well as a bunch of other people who enjoy our cars and don't take themselves too seriously.

To me, that has been the best thing about being a member of the CCOA - meeting great folks who enjoy their cars as much as I do, and can always teach me something new.

And, I've gotten my brother involved in the Cougar hobby as well: he's restored a Grecian Gold '68 XR-7 which now resides in Australia, and is now restoring a Lime Frost sunroof-equipped '68 XR7-G.

As an adjunct, since having my first Cougar, I have collected FoMoCo literature from the 1967-73 period, and am interested in just about anything else from this time period that relates to our cars.

One of the things that have been a continuing challenge for the CCOA, in my opinion, is keeping the members consistently engaged. In the electronic age, I think it's very important to have a good online presence, and for those of us who are 40+, to remember that if we are to continue as a club and gain new members, we must engage all Cougarphiles. This means that we need better mentor new/younger members, keep our Facebook page interesting, the website fresh,

etc. Communication methods and information sharing options have changed quite a bit in the last few years and the club needs to be actively engaged on a consistent basis with the general public in a variety of ways. This is hard to do with a volunteer club, but will definitely benefit us all. And, honestly, I feel that anyone who accepts a club office position needs to clearly understand the amount of time and effort it will take, and honor the commitment they make to the CCOA and its membership.

LIFE WITH CATS

Back in the spring of 1968, I had a 1968 Cougar,

a Dan Gumey Special, with a 3speed manual, heavy duty shocks, power steering and brakes, and heavy-duty battery. I ordered it, and bought it new, after trying to decide between a Cougar and a Firebird. I had that Cougar for about five years and sold it to my brother. A couple years later, I wanted a car for my wife, so I bought it back. We had it for a

couple years, then my wife sold it to the first guy that asked about it. She bought a used Corvette.

A while after that, I saw my old Cougar in a guy's driveway and stopped to see if he wanted to sell it. The interior, however, was trashed, and the body was rusty, so I opted out. So much for my pride and joy.

Still, I had a liking for Cougars, even if they had gotten bigger and bigger under the Ford Motor

Company presidency of Bunkie Knudsen.

In August of 1979,I was reading a copy of Auto Trader and saw an ad for a 1970 XR-7 convertible, blue with a white top. I did think the '70 Cougar was the prettiest of the lot. The ad had a very poor picture of the car. I called and told the woman who answered the phone I was going to Europe for a couple of weeks, and not to sell it until I got back. I

thought I'd never be able to dicker for it, now.

However, I'd always wanted a blue convertible since both my brother and my sister had blue convertibles, so I hoped to manage to get this car, if it was a good one. I returned from Europe and called her right away. She still had it. It was about 100 miles away, and I drove up to see it.

The seller was the original owner, and she had all kinds of receipts for the maintenance of it.

However, the floor was very rotted out. Other things looked about right for the odometer mileage, a little less than 35,000.

I told her it wasn't really what I expected and I was able to get the price down a little. Later, I called her on the phone and told her I'd take it.

When I arrived, I was told she'd now thrown all those receipts out and that they were gone. She said she threw them out, because we had a deal. Probably should have been a little suspicious of that, because the car had obviously been repainted and a little bodywork had been done. They might have contrived much of that impressive documentation.

I do have the factory invoice from the car. Thanks to CCOA, I bought it from Lois Eminger, who advertised in *At the Sign of the Cat,* and had purchased the documents from FoMoCo after she retired from the Blue Oval. They are now available from Marti Auto.

I did replace the floor, but have done very little on the car. I put a car alarm in it--two of them, actually. The first never worked. Anyway, I'll never really know whether the miles were 35,000 or 135,000. But, it's been a good car for me, quite trouble-free.

I've had the car since September of 1979, and now have about 46,000 on the odometer. The gas gauge doesn't work, the clock pretty much doesn't work. The factory 8-track just quit on me about a year ago. It has an AM/8-track radio. This car too has a three-speed manual transmission, just like my '68. It has power steering, but no

power brakes. Big mistake, I'd say.

Within a month or so after getting the Cougar, I saw an ad in a car collecting magazine for the Cougar Club of America. I was already a member of the Convertible Club of America (a long-defunct club), but I still have the T-shirt.

I wanted to develop contacts with other Cougar owners and parts suppliers, so I immediately wrote a letter to Tom Jacobellis, the president of the club, asking to join the club, and anteing up the membership cost.

I mentioned to Tom that I had a sweat-shirt with a Cougar decoration by Ed "Rat Fink" Roth. (I think that he was called the Rat Fink. Maybe, that was just the character he often drew.)

Tom was very interested in that shirt. He wrote back and wanted to know where I got it. I'd had

it since I had the '68 Cougar. I do still have the shirt, as well as some other T-shirts.

I bought a couple of CCOA T-shirts from that era which I still have. They are blue with one of the old decorations, showing the 1967-1973 theme we had then. I got some ballpoint pens, which I still have. Of course, I have an assortment of decals.

The newsletters were very simple back then, just Xeroxed sheets.
But worth having and keeping

and I think I still have all of them.

I went to the first national meeting, near Richmond, VA, where I met Tom Jacobellis. I don't remember the year, but it was the first meeting.

Over the years, I've bought some advertising materials, a shop manual, and other things for my Cougar. I have a litter of Beanie Baby Cougars. I have a Cougar stein. I have several Hot Wheelsand Matchbox-sized Cougars.

I still remain a member, even though I don't actively participate. A few years ago, the national meeting was in Niagara Falls, but I lost track of the date and missed it. I'd have gone, otherwise.

The club seems to have struggled some, over the years, but it's really more sophisticated in its operation. I realize the internet is part of the reason. However, the base of active club members seems to be much better than in the early days. I still look forward to the enewsletters.

At one time, I bought a parts car, another 1970 coupe, not an XR-7. After many years, our village zoning people objected to my having an unregistered vehicle, so I removed some easily accessible parts and sent it to the junkman. I did do some investigating to see if anyone wanted it. It was badly rusted so nobody missed much. It had a Windsor engine, whereas my Cougar has a 351 Cleveland. When the junk man loaded the car, we both crossed our fingers it would go on the truck in one piece.

The car I have has the original top, and I think it leaks. However, I wash it only once a year and otherwise it's never wet. In the 33 years I've had it, it's been rained on once and sprinkled on maybe fifteen times. I probably average about 600 miles a year. My wife loves the car. We go to local car shows and cruise-ins.

As far as the club is concerned, probably the most memorable thing was going to the national meeting and meeting Tom Jacobellis, face-to-face. It's kind of a shame I've never gotten to another one.

In 1989, I tried out a new red XR-7, with supercharger, four-speed manual, and CD player. I loved that car, but thought I should get it for \$500 less, so I walked. Whoops. Somebody else got it.

I do wish Cougars had stayed the size they were in 1967-68.

Lastly, a picture of my three "7"s. At one time, I owned a 1970 XR-7, a 1980 Zephyr Z-7, and a 1982 LN-7, all Mercurys.

I received a call back, four days later from an elderly man who said that he has had the ad posted for three weeks and hasn't received a call. I didn't mention to him the spelling or lack of information in his ad. I couldn't get the pen fast enough to write down his address.

I was in Las Vegas at the time and he was forty five miles west. It took us less than thirty minutes to be at his door, **[Ed. !!]** -- and that included a stop at the Bank. **[Ed. !!!]**

There it sat on the edge of his dirt driveway, he stated that he recently started it and pulled it around from the lean-to it was parked in, in his backyard.



Upon closer inspection of the car, we noticed an outline of a sticker on the back seat glass window, old Ford blue paint, chipped and flaked off on spots on the air cleaner and valve covers, reveling what looked like chrome underneath. 1969 *Mercury* Cougar Shelby Check Cloth and Vinyl Trim Option

For a short period of time, a little known trim option was offered on the 1969 Cougar. The Shelby Check Cloth and Vinyl Trim option came in two trim colors and was limited to the seats only. The January 13, 1969 Product Order Book does not list this option. The Cougar featured in this in this article has a build date of April 21, 1969. The 1969 Color and Trim book at West Coast Classic Cougar has a "peel and stick" addition for this trim, placed on the page after the book was printed. We were only able to get a price for this option from a window sticker.

Shelby Check Cloth and Vinyl Trim option \$19.50

Available on Standard and XR-7 Hardtops. We don't know if this option was available on Convertible and we don't know if there was a credit for the XR-7 because of the replacement of the more expensive standard leather trim. We assume, with the option price of \$19.50, the Décor Option is not mandatory for this option.

Cougars in Miniature

This article will start a new type of Cougar toy. I will now start with the Plastic models that we were eager to build, customize, and then discard as we got older. Thank goodness someone had the forethought to save these for us to enjoy now.

The first set of models pictured are not of a Cougar as we have come to own and enjoy. These are of the "Ford" Cougar II as it is called. This car was a concept car that was built by Ford for the Auto Shows.

The Cougar II has been shown at the Petersen Museum in Los Angeles as part of a Concept Car display in 1998. The Cougar II had a fiberglass body, a 260 High-Performance engine and a four-speed transmission. It was a GT



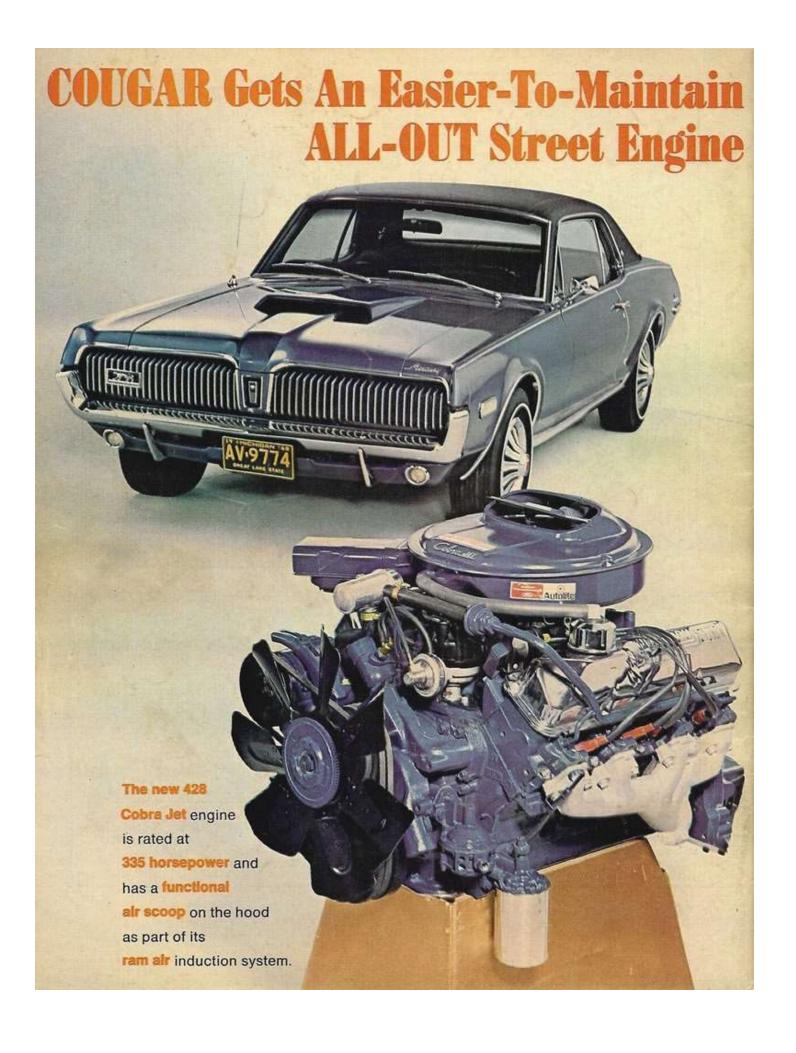
two-passenger sports car that appeared to be a suitable contender for the Chevrolet Corvette String Ray. The car had a fastback roof, concealed 'pop-up' headlights, and full instrument interior.

The high-performance 260 cubic-inch V8 engine was capable of carrying the Cougar II to an estimated top speed of 170 miles per hour. When interior air pressure exceeded 15 pounds per square inch, a relief panel across the rear of the passenger compartment would automatically open. The purpose of this panel was to relieve the extreme pressure that would be caused at high speeds, which may have resulted in the rear window being blown out. Another feature to the car was a spring-loaded window-lift mechanism to the curved side windows..

On the Testers box, they add a Historical data section. It reads: "When the Cougar II was first shown in the Summer of 1964, it was touted by the press as FoMoCo's answer to the new Chevrolet Stingray Corvette. Actually, nothing could have been further from the truth. Cougar II was a teaser, to arouse the public interest so that when Ford's Lincoln Mercury division came out with the Cougar (based on the Mustang) they would be ready to buy. They were. Cougar II had no outward and little inside similarities to the production Cougar. It was however a bold and exciting design study which sold plenty of cars at the Sign of the Cat."

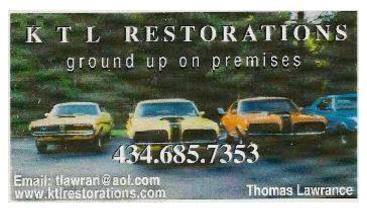

20 YEAR HISTORY OF THE MERCURY STRAY CATS COUGAR CLUB – 1993-2013

1992-1993 - Before the Stray Cats was founded.

Before the Stray Cats were founded they were the Concord Chapter of the Nor-Cal Cougar Club. Their first meeting was held at Paisano's Pizza in Concord on August 12, 1992 with the purpose of a good core group to establish the guidelines of what was needed to serve the NCCC members who live outside the general Sunnyvale area, mainly in the North East Bay Area. 25 people showed up at that meeting to express their support.

The Concord Chapter of Nor-Cal Cougar Club was established and continued to operate until it was terminated by the group to form their own independent Cougar club. On March 12, 1993 the group formed the Mercury Stray Cats Cougar Club.

Significant Events & Facts

Mercury Stray Cats Cougar Club Founded March 12, 1993.

1993 - How 'Cat'istoga Came About.

On September 25, 1993 the Stray Cats made their first wine country outing to Calistoga and the Petrified Forest. This began an annual tour outing to the Calistoga and the Napa Valley wineries.

Over the years the 'Cat'istoga wine tour took them to different areas including Napa Valley, Sonoma

Valley, Pope Valley, West Sonoma, Alexander Valley, Placerville, and Livermore Valley.

Many of the 'Cat'istoga outings included trips to the Petrified Forest (St. Helena), Geysers (Calistoga), 'Big Daddy's Car Show (Calistoga), Hub Cap Ranch (Angwin), Sacramento River Delta Cruise (Rio Vista), South Lake Tahoe Cruise (Nevada), Horizon Resort Casino-Hotel (Nevada), and the Infineon Raceway (Sonoma).

1995 - Stray Cats Host the 1995 CCOA Cougar Nationals West Car Show

On July 2nd the Stray Cats hosted the 1995 CCOA Cougar Nationals West at the Concord Hilton Hotel in Concord. Cougar enthusiasts from California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, New Mexico, Texas and Tennessee attended this great event.

A video of a rare interview with Ed Leslie, former 1967 Factory Mercury Cougar Team Member Trans-Am Series, was shown at the awards banquet. Ed Leslie was made Honorary member #98 of the Stray Cats.

The primary organizer and sponsor of this event was Ron Johnson – Stang-it Cougar & Mustang

1996 to Present SC/NCCC Joint 'Classic Cougar' Car Show & Picnic

August 25, 1996 was the 1st SC/NCCC "Classic Cougar" Car Show/Picnic at Kennedy Grove Park in El Sobrante. This annual event is a day for Cougar enthusiasts, family and friends to get together to enjoy a day of games, BBQ lunch and a no judged 'Participant's Choice' car show.

It is held at different parks in the San Francisco Bay area every year.

The parks have included Kennedy Grove Park in El Sobrante, Ed R. Levin Park in Milpitas, Lafayette Reservoir Park in Lafayette, McNear's Beach in San Rafael, and Lake Chabot Park in San Leandro.

Ernie Cardoza has been coordinating the joint club car show every year since the first show.

Cougars at the Beautiful Port Angeles Venue

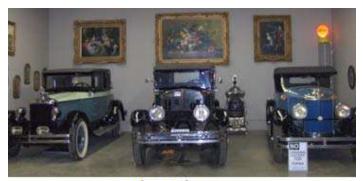

M60 Cougars By Barrie Dixon (#156)



June 4, 2013, as I write this report, is exactly 40-years since I bought my first Cougar.

OK, so that's not quite a "club report" but I thought you might like to share that time-line with me before I tell you what's happening here in the UK.

In the past few months it's been announced that the Government have upped the cut-off date for zero road tax to include all cars manufactured before January 1, 1974. That means that all six-years of the "classic" Cougar finally fall under the "Historic" category. It's not clear if this date will

continue to roll forward, as it did before Gordon Brown's tenure in Downing Street, but it is a step in the right direction and something that George Osborne promised would happen once the climate was right to do so.

There have also been changes to the MOT for older cars. Most of these changes won't affect us, but we do need to make sure that our cars are of a "roadworthy standard" before we take them along for their annual test. We always do that anyway. Right?

What about my Cougar? Did the work I did earlier in the year cure my dead battery situation? Well, the windows respond better, now that I did a rewire and I still have a reasonably voltage after a week rather than a dead battery after 3-days, but there is still a problem somewhere. I had been looking for a horrific short circuit. It turns out that it was no such thing. It was an *open* circuit that was causing the problem. I'm not too sure if it's the 10-year old central locking system that's the cause of the problem or if it's the swing steering and its 46-year old components. I do know that since I disconnected them both, I have a full charge in the battery and I'm happy about that: I can live with leaning across to lock/unlock the passenger door and the swing steering hasn't worked that good since I've had the car (30-years in September), therefore neither one is a major loss. I still have a few issues with the spare battery in the trunk, which I won't get into, but it's there if I need that extra bit of power to get me started.

Now, if I can figure out why the alternator keeps tripping the circuit breaker, maybe I can drive the car at night without fear the lights will drain the power before I get home. Oh, wait! I have a spare battery in the trunk, so that should help.
